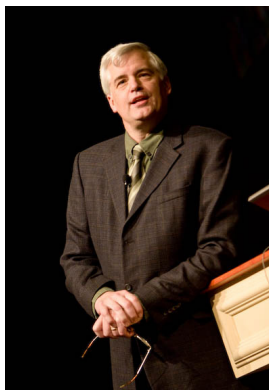
Rebuilding Our Sacred Honor: *Investing Our Inheritance*

It is our privilege to again host Dr. Paul Jehle as he expands and deepens last year's message on Christian Government and principled liberty. An engaging speaker, experienced pastor, educator and historian, Dr. Jehle will be

delving again into the principles of honorable action and understanding for Americans today, making it interesting, applicable and plainly understandable to all ages.

Dr. Jehle currently serves as pastor of the New Testament Church of Cedarville in Plymouth, MA, president and founder of Heritage Institute Ministries, principal and founder of the New Testament Christian School, and as the education director and executive director of the Plymouth Rock Foundation.



Herb Titus, Esq.

Herb Titus, Esq. brings a wealth of principled wisdom and practical knowledge to us for the 2010 Liberty Day Conference. His views and work on constitutional law have been received among members of Congress, state legislatures, public policy organizations, and others for years. Titus is admitted to practice before the United States Supreme Court.

Titus graduated with a J.D. degree (cum laude) from Harvard Law School in 1962. Herb Titus worked in the U.S. Dept. of Justice before serving as a professor of law at Oklahoma, Colorado, and Oregon State Universities, at which time he supported many causes like: opposing the war in Vietnam, supporting abortion, and homosexual rights. Titus was then a cooperating attorney with the ACLU.

In 1975, Titus became a Christian and since then has devoted his energies in a different direction. Along with Roy Moore, he was an original drafter of the Constitution Restoration Act. Titus has also been involved in numerous written works including the book "God, Man, and Law: The Biblical Principles", a widely-acclaimed text on American common law. Currently, he is of counsel with the law firm William J. Olson, P.C.

Titus currently resides and practices law in Virginia. He and his wife, Marilyn, have been married 46 years, have four children and 14 grandchildren.

Adults ages 19-99 - up to 250 words

Be sure to include author's name, date of birth, phone number, and email address.

Email your essay as a Microsoft Word document. Mailed essays must be printed on white paper in 12 point Times New Roman font.
